South Carolina Report for VOR 2016 Annual Meeting & Washington Initiative - June 2016

Parents of the Regional Centers (ICF/IID) are concerned about the low salaries, recruitment and retention of direct care staff at the 5 Regional Centers in the State of South Carolina.

Recent letters sent from 3 of the 5 parent/advocate groups of the regional centers to several SC legislators, the SC Department of Disabilities and Special Needs (DDSN) Commissioners and the director of DDSN has helped to raise awareness of the shortage of direct care staff, the extreme overtime being laid upon staff and the need for salary increases beyond what staff received this year as stated in the report below. Staff are being held over 4 to 8 hours many days of the week due to shortage in coverage. Also clients with behavioral challenges are being admitted to the regional centers because they can not be served in the community due to the lack of qualified providers. This has caused staff normally taking care of 4 to 6 clients to be pulled to a 1 on 1 position with these behaviorally challenged clients, thus causing even more of a staff shortage to our medically fragile clients.

DDSN does recognize that the 5 DDSN Regional Centers (ICF/IID) are an important part of the continuum of care and a safety net for the most medically fragile and behaviorally challenged intellectually disabled. With this in mind they are searching for ways to recruit new staff and will be researching ways to find money for pay raises. Unfortunately time is critical as staff are already leaving for better paying jobs with less overtime.

We will continue to look for ways to solve these critical issues.

On another issue, we find that the Regional Centers are not being offered as an option for residential care, unless it is an emergency. Only when parents know to call their legislators to request this option does this happen. We continue to find this disturbing that our regional centers (ICF/IID) are not an option mentioned.
